DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

INTRODUCTION

The NATO Mountain Warfare Centre of Excellence (NATO MW COE), located in the small village of Poljče in the Gorenjska region of Slovenia, is a multi-nationally sponsored and NATO-accredited international military institution which offers recognized expertise and experience for the benefit of the Alliance, especially in support of its transformation endeavours. It provides opportunities to expand education and training, improve interoperability and capabilities, assist in doctrine development, and test and validate concepts through experimentation in mountain warfare.

The mission of the NATO MW COE is to assist NATO member states, PfP nations, other countries, and international organizations to enhance mountain warfare capabilities through the following core areas:

- The development of mountain warfare-specific doctrine and tactics.
- Concept development and experimentation.
- The mountain warfare lessons learned process.
- Education and training.
- Support to capability development.

The NATO MW COE contributes to the transformation and adaptation of the Alliance's capabilities which enable its forces to better operate in the mountain environment. The Centre strives to set and meet standards and continues to foster interoperability, with the goal of upgrading the knowledge of mountain warfare already existing at both the national level and within NATO. 5th Mountain Warfare Congress – "Vertical Manoeuvre"



Aim:


To share national capabilities, techniques and procedures of cavalry units in support of Mountain Warfare.

Mobility Exoskeleton

Aim:

A study of mobility and the enhancement of the natural physical capabilities of mountain warriors by proper use of EXOSKELETON technology.

Objectives:

- To encompass the technical solutions for improving mobility to enhance the combat effectiveness of MW combatants. This solution allows soldiers to move and operate in mountainous terrain more effectively, spend less energy, and feel less exhausted while engaged in demanding mountain warfare activities.

Multi-domain Mountain Warfare Concept

Aim:

Synchronization of the military campaign across all domains (land, air, maritime, cyberspace, space) to enhance effectiveness and efficiency in mountain warfare.

Objectives:

- Transformation of operations from the purely land domain into multi-domains, thus gaining decisive advantages by forcing an enemy to confront multiple threats simultaneously from multiple domains.
- Primary integration focus should therefore be Joint Forces. Tactical mountain units should be taskorganized as multifunctional battle teams for distributed or semiindependent operations.



 Forces in the mountains should have multi-domain capabilities at all levels and employ optimized manned-unmanned combined arms teams for both mounted and dismounted operations.

The aim of this course is to provide officers at the light infantry platoon/company level and staff officers of different branches at the level of light infantry battalion/regiment, from NATO and Partner Nations, with in-depth knowledge and understanding of mountain warfare, to foster the development of leadership and management skills, and to enhance their understanding of the





specifics of mountainous terrain and climate when planning and conducting operations in this environment.

The course can be held outside the NATO MW COE as a Mobile Education and Training Team activity (METT), in cooperation with requesting nations.



Structure of the Course:

The two-week course is comprised of three parts: leadership, movement and tactics, and is carried out in a combination of teaching methods such as classroom lectures, teamwork and fieldwork, to build capabilities from easy to difficult.

The first week focuses on building the students' knowledge of the specifics of the mountainous environment, its influence on combat functions, and the best ways to mitigate negative effects and seize opportunities. Students will be introduced to the importance of leadership skills in critical situations, of SMEs in the preparation and execution of training and military operations, and of proper mountaineering/winter equipment for movement in difficult terrain.

In the second week, the course participants will be faced with a tactical situation in order to develop the ability to overcome the challenges of fighting in areas where technological supremacy can be negated by terrain or climate, and combat power can only be achieved by good planning and skills.

The students will train in and carry out troop leading procedures, taking into consideration the specifics of mountainous terrain and its influence on combat power. After building COAs based on map reconnaissance, they will execute an on-foot recce in the area of operations to assess the implications of mountainous terrain on the planning process and conducted activities.

Learning Objectives:

- Summarize the NATO MW Education and Training Architecture;
- Identify the main class, terrain and climate characteristics of a given mountainous area;
- Understand Mountain Warfare capabilities requirements and developments;
- Identify company equipment and capabilities requirements and existing NATO capabilities for operating in a mountainous environment;
- Apply leadership competencies and actions to get results in mountainous environment operations;
- Understand the dynamics of the mountainous environment in military operations;
- Conduct activities with sub-level units in all forms of mountainous areas, in all weather conditions;
- Be able to move through all forms of mountainous area, in all weather conditions;
- Organize casualty rescue from inaccessible terrain or snow avalanche;
- Identify constraints and opportunities that the mountainous environment has on conducting operations;
- Understand the special characteristics and fundamentals of military operations in the mountainous environment;
- Plan operations of light infantry company units in difficult mountainous terrain.

Basic Mountain Warfare Small Units Leader Course

NATO ETOC Course Code: LOP-LO-35586

28 August - 08 September 2023, Knin, Croatia

The aim of this course is to provide leaders at the light infantry team/squad level and leaders of different branches from NATO and Partner Nations with in-depth knowledge and understanding of mountain warfare and of the specifics of mountainous terrain and climate when conducting operations in this environment.

The course will be held at military training facilities in Croatia as a Mobile Education and Training Team activity (METT), in cooperation with the Armed Forces of the Republic of Croatia.

Structure of the Course:

The two-week course is comprised of leadership, planning and movement, and will be carried out in a combination of teaching methods such as classroom lectures, teamwork and fieldwork to build capabilities from easy to difficult.

At the beginning, the course focuses on building the students' knowledge of the specifics of the mountainous environment, its influence on combat functions, and the best ways to mitigate negative effects and seize opportunities. Students will be introduced to the importance of leadership skills in critical situations, of SMEs in the preparation and







execution of training and military operations, and of proper mountaineering/winter equipment for movement in difficult terrain.

Next, the course participants will be faced with a tactical situation and will learn to create a Mountain Situation Plan to provide awareness of the hazardous aspects of the mountain environment to tactical commanders before making decisions.

Finally, the students will be trained in mountaineering abilities and skills at designated training facilities, in accordance with ATrainP-6, and apply this knowledge in a real mountain environment situation.

- Identify the main class, terrain and climate characteristics of a given mountainous area;
- Understand Mountain Warfare capabilities requirements and developments;
- Identify the necessary equipment and capabilities requirements and existing NATO capabilities for operating in a mountainous environment;
- Apply leadership competencies and actions to achieve results in operations in a mountainous environment;
- Understand the characteristics and dynamics of military operations in a mountainous environment;
- Conduct activities in all forms of mountainous areas, under all weather conditions;
- Be able to move through all forms of mountainous areas, in all weather conditions;
- Organize casualty rescue from inaccessible terrain or snow avalanche.

Mountain Warfare Staff cer Course

NATO ETOC Course Code: LOP-LO-35516

05-16 June 2023 at NATO MW COE, Poljče, Slovenia

The Mountain Warfare Staff Officer Course is a higher level of mountain light infantry/light infantry officer training, preparing students to carry out staff duties in mountain operations. Its purpose is to provide independent and group training during which students use their acquired knowledge to plan, organize and conduct training in units of a particular branch/service/specialty in mountain terrain.




This course is designed for NATO Member and Partner Nations requiring the particular knowledge and skills necessary to safely and efficiently operate in the complex terrain and climatic conditions of the mountain environment.

Structure of the Course:

The two-week course is comprised of three parts: a General Module, a Module of the Tactics and Doctrine of Mountain Warfare, and the Staff Operations Module. The students will be introduced to the NATO Planning Process using NATO standards based on the Comprehensive Operations Planning Directive (COPD) by means of the steps of the Military Decision-Making Process (MDMP).

The first week focuses on the introduction of the specifics of the mountain environment, familiarization with military mountaineering equipment, and the role of mountain troops in the preparation and execution of training and military operations. Next the students will learn about the influence of climate and terrain specifics on combat functions.



In the second week, the course

participants will be faced with a tactical situation and be trained in planning procedures, taking into consideration the specifics of mountainous terrain and its influence on combat power.

Learning Objectives:

- Know the NATO Mountain Warfare (MW) Terminology;
- Present the Mountain Infantry Light Brigade structure, equipment and capabilities;
- Explain the role, tasks and main considerations of the work of the Mountain Cell (MC); present the main product of the MC;
- Present the fundamentals of movement and manoeuvre in mountainous/difficult terrain;
- Explain the characteristics of good leadership and the principles of C2 and communications in mountainous terrain:
- Know the steps of the intelligence process and the main methods for collecting data in support of conducting military operations in mountainous regions;
- Explain the specifics of fire support in mountainous terrain;
- Know the Force Protection (FP) planning considerations, principles, elements, measures, tasks and activities in mountainous terrain;





- Explain the sustainment considerations related to the mountain environment, and the fundamentals of health protection requirements for mountain operations;
- Know the Military Decision-Making Process (MDMP);
- Plan an operation of a ight infantry attalion in difficult mountainous terrain.

Basic Characteristics of the Mountain Environment e-Learning course

Aim:

To make individual soldiers, leaders, staff and commanders aware of the required capabilities in Mountain Warfare. 


